ICS and HICS What's the difference?

The basic principles and core concepts of the [Incident Command System \(ICS\)](#) and [Hospital \(Healthcare\) Incident Command System \(HICS\)](#) are very similar. HICS assists healthcare organizations in improving their emergency management planning, response, and recovery capabilities for unplanned and planned events. HICS will benefit anyone with a response role during a crisis including hospital physicians, nurses, and administrators. Community partners with whom healthcare facilities collaborate (e.g., public safety, local health department, emergency management, etc.) will find HICS useful in understanding healthcare response issues and incident command practices and tools used during various events with health impacts.

The primary HICS users are representatives from hospitals of all sizes and service delivery models (missions), including healthcare providers, health care facilities, healthcare organizations, rehabilitation and urgent care centers, critical access hospitals, ambulatory surgical centers, long-term care and psychiatric treatment facilities, intermediate care facilities, rural health clinics.

It is important to understand that HICS training *is not* a replacement for [ICS training](#). HICS is a supplement to ICS, while many of the principles and concepts of ICS are the same the biggest difference are the [HICS forms](#) beyond the Incident Action Plan. HICS has customized many of the [ICS forms](#) to fit the needs of healthcare facilities and incidents related to disaster medicine and public health.

*****New novel virus cases grow in the US - 2019 Novel Coronavirus Update***

On January 29, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) announced that 165 suspected cases of 2019-nCoV are under investigation in 36 states, while 68 people have tested negative for the novel coronavirus, 5 have been confirmed. As of this date, no deaths in the US have been confirmed related to the virus. HHS releases Emergency Planning Guidance for Behavioral Health Facilities

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) in the United States Office of Health and Human Services released the [“Disaster Planning Handbook for Behavioral Health Treatment Programs”](#).

According to the handbook, behavioral health programs provide essential service as outlined in Emergency Support Function #8 and are obligated to prepare for emergencies. The guide specifically targets the special needs of the populations involved, how to identify essential staff and financial considerations.

The intended audience for this planning guide is facility disaster planning team members and any administrators, clinicians, trainers and senior staff who may work as part of such a team during emergencies. This handbook supplies many worksheets to aid the planning process and gives examples of effective processes and best practices. Serious Flood Concerns in the NEW HERC Region

Flooding continues to be in issue in the region. In early January the city of Oconto experienced significant flooding because of a large ice jam on the Oconto river. The flooding led to concern for the safety of a nursing home near the center of the city. NEW HERC member Lieutenant Ryan Pecha of the Oconto Fire Department provided an update on response efforts from his department’s perspective at the January monthly HERC meeting. At the February HERC meeting a representative from the Oconto hospital will provide an update on their preparations during the event. A staff member from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (WI DHS) have also been invited to present on their public flood map for healthcare and public health. NEW HERC releases information on HHS emPOWER Map

At the January meeting a presentation was given on the HHS emPOWER map. This interactive map gives public health officials, emergency managers, hospitals, and first responders the ability to discover the electricity-dependent Medicare population in their county, and ZIP Code.



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Over 2.5 million Medicare beneficiaries rely on electricity-dependent medical equipment, such as ventilators, to live independently in their homes. Severe weather like what part of our region experienced this past summer and other emergencies, especially those with long power outages can be life-threatening for these individuals. **** *Emergency Directive to Mitigate Windows Vulnerabilities***

A number of vulnerabilities in Microsoft Windows operating systems have been identified, if these vulnerabilities are not addressed they will pose a significant threat to the environment. On January 14, 2020, [Microsoft released a software patch to mitigate these vulnerabilities in supported Windows operating systems](#). Subsequently, The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) [released an Emergency Directive and Activity Alert](#) addressing critical vulnerabilities affecting Windows CryptoAPI and Windows Remote Desktop Protocol (RDP) server and client. Some of the vulnerabilities could enable a remote attacker to decrypt, modify, or inject data on user connections. DHS has determined that these vulnerabilities pose an unacceptable risk to the Federal enterprise and as a result has issued an emergency directives to all Federal agencies to patch their environment immediately. Due to the seriousness of these vulnerabilities, ASPR CIP strongly recommends that *all healthcare and public health* entities also consider patching their environment as soon as possible. This recommendation is based on the likelihood of the vulnerabilities being weaponized, combined with the widespread use of the affected software across the sector and high potential for a compromise of integrity and confidentiality of information.

FEMA Community Lifelines includes Health and Medical

Last Fall the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) as part of the update to the National Response Plan released Community Lifelines. A Lifeline enables the continuous operation of critical government and business functions and is essential to human health and safety or economic security. Lifelines are the most fundamental services in the community that, when stabilized, enable all other aspects of society to function. FEMA has developed a construct for objective-based response that prioritizes the rapid stabilization of Community Lifelines after a disaster. The integrated network of assets, services, and capabilities that provide lifeline services are used day-to-day to support the recurring needs of the community and enable all other aspects of society to function. When disrupted, decisive intervention (e.g., rapid re-establishment or employment of contingency response solutions) is required to stabilize the incident.

Efforts to protect lifelines, prevent and mitigate potential impacts to them, and building back stronger and smarter during recovery will drive overall resilience of the nation! The Community Lifelines Implementation Toolkit provides whole community partners the information and resources to understand lifelines, coordinate with entities using lifelines, and serve as basic guidance for how to implement the lifeline construct during incident response.
